Swiss watchmaker Jaeger-LeCoultre is exploring the many facets of an actress' life through a photographic exhibit at its Madison Avenue boutique in New York.



"Two Worlds" showcases images of Canadian screen star Sarah Gadon wearing a Rendez-Vous watch as a constant, with photography by Caitlin Cronenberg reflecting both her old and new life in New York. This exhibit celebrates the ever-present nature of a timepiece, as it travels with the wearer through time.

Tied together

Jaeger-LeCoultre's exhibition opened Nov. 17 and will close Nov. 30, giving consumers a short window in which to view the art.

Ms. Cronenberg's photography is meant to show the symbiotic relationship between Ms. Gadon and her watch. The actress became enamored of the Rendez-Vous back in 2013 at the Venice Film Festival, falling for the delicate timepiece's Art Deco touches, including a face surrounded by diamonds.

Shots take place in Brooklyn, the actress' home, and Manhattan, where she explores.
