Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, dies at 99

Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh and husband to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, peacefully passed away at Windsor Castle this morning at the age of 99.



Philip had experienced various illnesses and hospital stays in recent years, with his most recent release from the hospital in February. Government leaders, journalists and brands are taking to social media to express support for Philip and Queen Elizabeth, who were married for more than 70 years.

"This is obviously a very sad day for Her Majesty, the Royal Family and the whole country," said Sir Lindsay Hoyle, speaker of the house of commons of the United Kingdom, in a statement. "Prince Philip has performed wide-ranging official roles, carrying out thousands of engagements and overseas visits on behalf of the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth.

"He will be remembered for his loyal devotion to service and his leadership of hundreds of ideals and causes close to his heart," he said.

A life remembered

Philip joined the Royal Navy as a teenager and served in World War II where he would later receive the Greek War Cross of Valor for his services in the Navy.

Philip and Queen Elizabeth married in 1947. The young couple received more than 2,500 wedding gifts from around the world.

Philip was known for his unwavering support of his wife, sometimes even stepping in for her at events to speak and represent the monarchy.

On their wedding anniversary on Nov. 20, 1997, Queen Elizabeth referred to her husband as her strength, highlighting the support he showed her and the greater world at large.

"Quite simply, [he has] been my strength and stay all these years, and I and his whole family, in this and many other countries, owe him a debt greater than he would ever claim or we shall ever know," Queen Elizabeth said.
