A force in fashion

Ms. Chiuri is lauded as one of the most successful designers in the fashion industry, producing work with a strong artistic vision that caters to the needs of women.

She began her tenure at Dior in 2016 and has produced work with strong themes of empowerment, unity and feminism. Her work invites women to highlight their genuine identities.
